

InfoTrac features:

- Most articles available in full text, many with images
- Includes reliable medical sources, encyclopedia, and dictionaries
- Includes these databases:
 - **New York Times:** Full text for the past 12 months
 - **InfoTrac Custom 150 Full Text Newspapers**
 - **Health Reference Center Academic:** Full text and image articles on medical and health information; includes dictionary and encyclopedia entries.
 - **Health & Wellness Resource Center:** Consumer and professional health articles, reference book material
 - **General Reference Center Gold:** latest current events, popular culture, business and industry coverage, arts and sciences, sports, hobbies, etc.
 - **AncestryPlus:** Useful tool for starting a genealogical search
 - **Computer Database**
 - **Expanded Academic ASAP:** scholarly journals from all academic disciplines
 - **InfoTrac OneFile:** Large database covering many subjects

Accessing and Using InfoTrac:

1. From the Thompson Library home page (lib.umflint.edu), click on the link:
Periodicals: Indexes & Full Text
 2. In the left margin, click on the *InfoTrac* link
 3. Select a database to search by clicking on the database title (you may select only one database at a time).
 4. When the search screen appears, enter your search terms in the spaces provided. Keyword searching is the default, but you may choose to search by author, title or other criteria by clicking the drop-down menu on the left. Combine terms using Boolean operators (AND, OR) from the drop-down menu on the right.
 5. You may limit searches by date, or limit results to full-text or refereed articles using "Limit the current search" feature.
 6. In search results, view an article by clicking on the title or the word **Text**.
- Articles may be printed, emailed, or saved to disk.
 - At the bottom of each article further references (narrower and broader terms, reference book entries, cross references, etc.) are listed.
 - For citations without full text in InfoTrac, you will see the link **Find Full Text** in the results list and in the full record for the article. Click that link to see if Thompson Library has the article in print or online in another database.
