

JSTOR features:

1. Journals indexed in JSTOR are considered the core research journals of the discipline for which they are published.
2. Full text searching available.
3. Searches may be limited to the journals published for a specific discipline.
4. Full text articles in Adobe Acrobat format which can be printed and/or saved.

Accessing and Using JSTOR

1. At the library's homepage (lib.umflint.edu) click *Periodicals: Indexes & Full Text*.
2. In the left margin, click *JSTOR*.

Note: at this point, a UM-Flint student logging on from off campus will be asked to enter his/her username and password.

3. Use *Basic Search* for simple searches, or click *Advanced Search* for more complex searches (e.g., exact phrase searching; to limit search to a particular discipline; etc.)
4. Enter terms to be searched. Use quotation marks to indicate phrases.
5. Searches, by default, are done in the **full text** of **all** the journals in the database.
To change this setting, under "Narrow your search to," click the fields you want to search. For example, for a topical search, it is appropriate to select the title and abstract fields to search (this is recommended, unless your list of results is too limited, in which case searching full text is appropriate).
6. You may further limit your search by searching only journals published in a particular field. At the bottom of the search screen, click the box to the left of any subjects you want to search (you can click as many as are useful).
7. Click on the *search* button. A list of articles that match your search terms will display.
8. Click an article title to see the article. Create bibliographies by clicking "Save Citation" while looking at the article. These lists of saved citations may be emailed or saved to a file. Emailed bibliographies include links back to the full-text article.
9. Emailing articles: JSTOR does not provide for emailing the full text of an article, but you can save articles to disk or print them, and, as stated in number 8 above, a link to a full-text article can be emailed within a saved citation list.
