

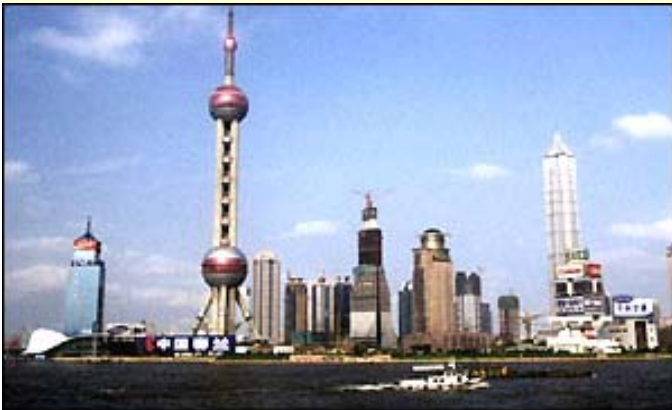

### China: The World's Factory

### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Each Spring Term, the IGS and School of Management organizes a China Study Abroad trip. This trip provides you an opportunity to study and learn about dynamics of a rising economic system. You will observe directly Chinese economy and market in the changing economic environment and will understand opportunities, challenges, and problems that exist in China today, especially China as a new member of World Trade Organization (WTO). You will have opportunities to communicate and exchange ideas with Chinese faculty, business students, business professionals, and local people. Furthermore, you will visit Chinese organizations and acquaint yourself with Chinese business culture.

During the trip, you will visit Beijing, the capital of China, and Shanghai, the financial and commercial center of the country. Peking University in Beijing and Tongji University in Shanghai host the trip. Both universities will issue study certificates.

A series of lectures and seminars on the current Chinese political, legal, social and economic environments and its rich

history and culture will be given at Peking University and Tongji University. You will visit several business organizations. You will also have trips to historic and cultural sites such as Great Wall, Forbidden City, Tiananmen Square, Shanghai Bund, Yu Garden, and Zhou Village, and other sites.

This trip is a 3 credits course. Any continuing UM-Flint student is eligible for the China study trip. You must enroll for INT394 in Spring 2007. INT394 can be used to replace BUS391-Directed Research in Business for undergraduate requirement or MGT591-Applied Research Project for MBA degree requirement in Spring 2006. This trip is also open to others who would like to participate in this educational experience without academic credit.

### PROGRAM FEES

The Program Fees will be approximately \$2,600, depending on airline fares and exchange rate fluctuations. The program fee includes airfare; local transportation and tour fees; lodging and meals; lecturers and facility charges; visa fees, and agency charges. The following is the estimated cost structure for each participant:

Airfare:	\$1250
Visa fees:	110
Lecture & facility charge:	420
Lodging and meal:	620
Local Transportation:	160
Tour tickets and fees:	<u>40</u>
<b>Total</b>	<b>\$2600</b>

The \$2,600 program fee does not include: tuition, passport fees, and additional personal expenses, which are the responsibility of the participants.

Passports are required and applications may be obtained at your nearest U.S. Post Office. In addition, visas are required for travel to China. Information on visa applications will be provided by the program coordinator.

A non-refundable deposit of \$100 by January 5, 2007 must accompany every application. Final payment for program fees (\$2,500) is due by February 20, 2007 (Fluctuating airfares and exchange rates may affect this amount). A fee of \$50 will be added to each late payment.

The course enrollment is limited to the first 20 participants who make their deposits to enroll in the program.



### COURSE CANCELLATION POLICY AND PROGRAM FEE REFUNDS

**Tuition:** Students who register and then decide not to attend, must notify the Registrar's Office in writing by April 28, 2007, to avoid tuition charges.

**Program fees:** The following refunds policy applies to the program fee.

Cancellation	Cost Forfeiture
Before purchase of airline ticket	50% of program fee
After purchase of airline ticket	100% of program fee

The China trip has a minimum requirement of 12 students. If sufficient enrollment is not met by February 28, 2007, there is a possibility that this study trip will be cancelled.



### INSURANCE

The University will purchase the ISIC (International Student Identity Card) that provides for repatriation and basic insurance. The student should have Blue Cross/Blue Shield or a temporary insurance policy for international travel.

### RESPONSIBILITY

The University of Michigan-Flint acts as an agent for members of the study program and will not be responsible for delays, injuries, damages, loss or accidents to persons or property from any cause whatsoever. Affiliated organizations in China likewise accept no responsibility arising out of the above factors. The airlines concerned are not to be held responsible for any act or event during the time passengers are not on board their aircraft. The passenger's ticket shall constitute the sole contract between airline and student. We reserve the right to cancel this program prior to departure for any reason, including insufficient number of participants, in which case refunds will be made to applicants. If it becomes necessary or advisable for

any reason whatsoever to alter the itinerary arrangements, such alternations may be made. Additional expenses, if any, shall be borne by the passenger, likewise refunds shall be made to the passenger if any saving is effected. If a student's status in the course is discontinued due to inappropriate or illegal activity, the student will bear the costs involved with the termination. Enrollment and payment for the program constitutes your acceptance of the program conditions.
